Reconciling Statement


We celebrate God's gift of diversity and value the wholeness made possible in community equally shared and shepherded by all.

Neal is the author of "Justice in Everyday Life", "Thinking Theologically About Have and Have

Nots" and the video series available online, "Living our Principles". Neal organizes legislative action
focused on creation care, gun violence prevention, housing equity, immigration, voting rights, and
domestic violence. He has taught at Africa University in Zimbabwe and UMC universities in the DRC
and Nigeria and led workshops across countries in Africa, Europe, Eurasia and Russia, and the
Philippines as well as Brazil and Mexico. Neal served as a trauma hospital chaplain and local church
pastor starting in 1990. He attended Yale University Divinity School, Princeton Theological Seminary,
the American University School of International Service, and undertook doctoral coursework at Wesley
Theological Seminary.
